

Obtaining Licensure

To obtain your dental licensure, all states typically require applicants to:

- Graduate from a Commission on Dental Accreditation (CODA) accredited dental school, earning a DMD or DDS.
- Pass the Integrated National Board Dental Examination (INBDE) by the Joint Commission on National Dental Examinations (JCNDE).

Please refer to the ADA website for the policies, timelines and fees for the Boards. The INBDE is a computer-based exams and requires submissions of an on-line application and an appointment at a testing center to take the actual exam.

- The INBDE is accepted in all U.S. states and territories as fulfilling all or part of the written examination requirements for licensure. Refer to the INBDE Candidate Guide for more information
- Pass a simulated clinical exam administered by the testing agency where you plan to practice.

Attain Your State License

Once educational, written examination, and simulated clinical examination requirements are met, candidates can apply for a dental license in the state they wish to practice. Below are links to some state licensing authorities:

Attain Your DEA License – Form 224

In addition to a state license, dentists must obtain <u>federal and state DEA licenses</u> to prescribe controlled substances. Renewals occur every three years.
